#### 2022 HIGH SCHOOL AWARD WINNERS

#### HIGH SCHOOL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

#### **CLASS C**

**John-Paul Ricks** – Jehovah-Jireh (Baton Rouge) – The 6-0 senior averaged 28 points, 8 rebounds, 7 assists and 5 steals in leading second-seeded Jehovah-Jireh to its sixth straight Division V state finals appearance with a 20-12 record. He was also selected to the Baton Rouge *Advocate* All-Metro team and to participate in the Louisiana High School All-Star Game. He has been a two-time Class C Player of the Year and three-time first team Class C All-State selection. He has accepted a scholarship to play college basketball at Tallahassee Community College.

#### **CLASS B**

<u>Jordan Crawford</u> – Simsboro – The 6-2 senior averaged 16 points and 8 rebounds in leading top-seeded Simsboro to the Class B state championship with a 33-3 record. He has accepted a scholarship to play college basketball at Dawson Community College in Glendive, Montana.

#### **CLASS A**

**La'Bree Williams, Jr.** – Calvary Baptist (Shreveport) – The 6-6 senior averaged 24 points, 12 rebounds and 4.5 blocked shots in leading second-seeded Calvary Baptist to its third straight Division IV state finals appearance with a 24-8 record. He was also the Shreveport *Times* All-City Player of the Year and was selected to participate in the Louisiana High School All-Star Game.

#### **CLASS AA**

**Chris Lockett** – Newman (New Orleans) – The 6-3 junior averaged 13.5 points, 5.5 rebounds, 4.1 assists and 2 steals in leading top-seeded Newman to the Division III state championship with a 27-3 record. He was also selected to the New Orleans All-Metro Team. He has been a two-time first team Class 2A All-State selection. He is rated as one of the top 60 juniors in the nation by 247Sports and ESPN.

#### **CLASS AAA**

<u>Percy Daniels</u> – Madison Prep (Baton Rouge) – The 6-9 senior averaged 18 points, 12 rebounds, 5.6 blocked shots and 3 assists in leading top-seeded Madison Prep to its second straight Class 3A state championship with a 29-6 record. He was also selected to the LHSAA Marsh Madness All-Tournament team and was the Most Valuable Player in the Louisiana High School All-Star Game. Additionally, he was a Baton Rouge *Advocate* All-Metro selection. He has been a two-time first team Class 3A All-State selection. He has accepted a scholarship to play college basketball at Tulane University.

#### CLASS AAAA

Solomon Washington – Carver (New Orleans) – The 6-7 senior averaged 14.9 points, 11.1 rebounds, 3 assists, 2.6 blocked shots and 2.4 steals and had 23 double-doubles in leading top-seeded Carver to the Class 4A state championship with a 33-5 record, which was the school's first state title since 2003. The Louisiana Sports Writers Association named him "Mr. Basketball" in Louisiana, and he was named the Gatorade and MaxPreps Louisiana Player of the Year. He was also the New Orleans All-Metro Player of the Year and was the Most Outstanding Player on the LHSAA Marsh Madness All-Tournament team. He has been a two-time first team Class 4A All-State selection. He has accepted a scholarship to play college basketball at Texas A&M University.

#### **CLASS AAAAA**

<u>Jalen Bolden</u> – Zachary – The 6-5 senior averaged 20 points, 10 rebounds and 4 assists in leading top-seeded Zachary to its second straight Class 5A state championship with a 36-3 record. He was the Most Outstanding Player in the Class 5A title game and was selected to the LHSAA Marsh Madness All-Tournament team. He was also the Baton Rouge *Advocate* All-Metro Player of the Year and he participated in the Louisiana High School All-Star Game. He has accepted a scholarship to play college basketball at the University of Louisiana at Monroe.

#### HIGH SCHOOL COACH OF THE YEAR

#### CLASS C

**Isaac Fontenot-Amedee** – Family Christian (Baton Rouge) – In his first season at Family Christian, he led the top-seeded Flames to the Division V state championship with a 29-8 record, which was the school's first state title since 2002.

#### **CLASS B**

<u>Micah Rasberry</u> – Lacassine – This year he led fourth-seeded Lacassine to the Class B state semifinals with a 32-7 record, which was the school's first state tournament appearance since 2007. He was also named the Lake Charles *American Press* All-Southwest Louisiana Small Schools Coach of the Year.

#### **CLASS A**

**Harold Boudreaux** – Southern Lab (Baton Rouge) – In his first season at Southern Lab, he led the top-seeded Kittens to the Division IV state championship with a 29-4 record, which was the school's first state title since 2005.

#### CLASS AA

<u>Dimario Jackson</u> – Port Allen – In his first season at Port Allen, he led the second-seeded Pelicans to its third straight Class 2A state championship with a 24-10 record.

#### **CLASS AAA**

**Errol Gauff** – Hannan (Covington) – This year he led third-seeded Hannan to its first state tournament berth and to the Division II state championship with a 25-8 record. He was also the New Orleans *Times-Picayune* All-St. Tammany Parish Coach of the Year. This is the second time that he has been named state coach of the year.

#### **CLASS AAAA**

<u>Mack Jones</u> – Huntington (Shreveport) – This year he led fourth-seeded Huntington to the Class 4A state semifinals with a 27-6 record, despite the death of a starter the night before the state quarterfinal contest. He was also the Shreveport *Times* All-City Coach of the Year.

#### **CLASS AAAAA**

**Josh Carlin** – Northshore (Slidell) – In his first season at Northshore, he led the eleventh-seeded Panthers to the Class 5A state finals with a 28-7 record, which was the school's first state tournament appearance.

#### **2022 COLLEGE AWARD WINNERS**

#### JUNIOR COLLEGE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

**Isaiah Payne** – LSU-Eunice – The 6-2 sophomore guard was the Louisiana Community College Athletic Conference Player of the Year and a NJCAA All-Region 23 selection. He was also named to the NJCAA Region 23 All-Tournament team. He averaged 17.8 points, 4.3 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.3 steals and had a 1.9 assist-turnover ratio and a 37.2% three-point field goal percentage. He scored in double figures in 22 of 25 games, including ten 20+point games. His single game highs were 31 points, 10 rebounds, 6 assists, 4 three-point field goals made and 4 steals. He led LSU-Eunice to the LCCAC championship and to its first semifinal appearance in the NJCAA Region 23 Tournament with a 19-7 record.

#### JUNIOR COLLEGE COACH OF THE YEAR

**Byron Starks** – LSU-Eunice – He directed LSU-Eunice to the Louisiana Community College Athletic Conference championship and to its first semifinal appearance in the NJCAA Region 23 Tournament with a 19-7 record. He was the LCCAC Coach of the Year. This is the third straight year that Starks has received the Louisiana Junior College Coach of the Year award.

#### SMALL COLLEGE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

**Zach Wrightsil** – Loyola – The 6-7 senior guard-forward was the NAIA National Player of the Year, a first team NAIA All-American, and the Southern States Athletic Conference Player of the Year. He was also named to the NAIA All-Tournament team and the SSAC All-Tournament team, as well as being a six-time SSAC Player of the Week. He averaged 18.7 points (1st in SSAC), 8.8 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 2.1 steals and had a 62.0% field goal percentage and a 1.4 assist-turnover ratio. He scored in double figures in all 38 games, including sixteen 20+ point games. He had double figures in rebounds in 12 games, along with 12 double-double games and 1 triple-double game. He had single game highs of 33 points, 21 rebounds, 11 assists, 6 steals and 5 blocked shots. He led Loyola to a No. 2 ranking in the final regular season national poll, to the SSAC regular season and tournament championships and to the NAIA national championship with a 37-1 record.

#### SMALL COLLEGE COACH OF THE YEAR

Stacy Hollowell – Loyola – He guided Loyola to a No. 2 ranking in the final regular season national poll, to the Southern States Athletic Conference regular season and tournament championships and to the NAIA national championship with a 37-1 record. This was Loyola's first national championship since 1945 and Louisiana's first collegiate national title in 61 years. The 37 wins are a new Louisiana collegiate single season record. He was named the NAIA National Coach of the Year and SSAC Coach of the Year and was the HoopDirt NAIA national coach of the week on December 6th. Loyola led the nation in steals and turnovers forced and also led the SSAC in scoring (2<sup>nd</sup> in nation), assists (2<sup>nd</sup> in nation), field goal percentage and rebounding. This is the second time that Hollowell has received the Louisiana Small College Coach of the Year award.

#### MAJOR COLLEGE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

**Kenneth Lofton, Jr.** – Louisiana Tech – The 6-7 sophomore forward was a first team All-Conference USA and NABC All-District selection. He was also named to the C-USA All-Tournament team, as well as being a two-time C-USA Player of the Week. He averaged 16.5 points, 10.5 rebounds ( $1^{\rm st}$  in C-USA and  $10^{\rm th}$  in nation) and 2.8 assists and had a 53.9% field goal percentage. He scored in double figures in 28 of 33 games, including two 30+ point games and ten 20+ point games. He had double figures in rebounds in 19 of 33 games, along with 17 double-double games ( $1^{\rm st}$  in C-USA and  $10^{\rm th}$  in nation). His single game highs were 36 points, 18 rebounds, 18 assists, 18 steals and 18 blocked shots. He led Louisiana Tech to a third place finish in the West Division of C-USA and to the finals of the C-USA Tournament with a 24-10 record.

#### MAJOR COLLEGE COACH OF THE YEAR

**Eric Konkol** – Louisiana Tech – He led Louisiana Tech to a third place finish in the West Division of Conference USA and to the finals of the C-USA Tournament with a 24-10 record. Louisiana Tech led C-USA in field goal percentage defense. This is the third straight year that Konkol has received the Louisiana Major College Coach of the Year award.

#### PROFESSIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Cam Thomas – Brooklyn Nets (LSU) – He averaged 8.5 points, 2.4 rebounds and 1.2 assists and had an 82.9% free throw percentage as a guard for the Brooklyn Nets, who finished in fourth place in the NBA's Atlantic Division with a 44-38 record. He started 2 games and averaged 17.6 minutes per game. He scored 20 or more points in 10 games. His single game highs were 30 points, 8 rebounds, 4 three-point field goals made, 4 assists, 3 steals and 2 blocked shots. He is in his first year in the NBA.

### 2022 MR. LOUISIANA BASKETBALL AWARD WINNER

**Doug Ireland** – Northwestern State University – In 2019 Ireland retired from Northwestern St. after a distinguished 30-year career as the school's sports information director. In that position, he coordinated publicity efforts for the Demons' men's basketball program and its 13 other intercollegiate sports teams through local, regional and national media outlets in print, broadcast, television and internet. He also served as a men's basketball radio announcer for many years. Since 2000, he has earned 33 Louisiana Sports Writers Association awards, including the 2017 LSWA Story of the Year, with a majority of these awards coming from his stories of Northwestern St. athletes, coaches and support staff members.

Ireland is a 1986 graduate of Northwestern St. in broadcast journalism. Prior to working at Northwestern St., he was the Natchitoches Bureau chief of the Shreveport *Times*, an assistant sports information director at UL-Lafayette, the sports editor of the Natchitoches *Times*, and a sportswriter at the Alexandria *Town Talk*. He has been the chairman of the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame since 1990, during which time he has helped to make Louisiana basketball a prominent part of that hall of fame. He also helped lead the efforts to build the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame Museum in Natchitoches in 2013. He has received numerous professional honors during his career, including the LSWA's Mac Russo Award for contributions to the association's progress and ideals in 2001, the Alexandria *Town Talk*'s CENLA Sportsman of the Year in 2012, and the Southland Conference's Louis Bonnette Sports Media Award in 2016.

## 2022 LOUISIANA BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

**Jack Orsley** – Loyola University – Coach – 1939-49

Orsley won 173 games and lost only 73 during his ten years at Loyola, for a 70.3% career winning percentage. He led Loyola to two consecutive appearances in the NAIA Tournament, including the NAIA national championship in 1945 and a fourth place finish in 1946. He posted seasons of 25-5, 22-11, 21-3, 21-9, 14-2 and 15-5.
